FOOD FOR THOUGHT...a note from Your Pastor

And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. Acts 2

Holy Scripture is loaded with references to meals and feeding. It was often an essential element in Jesus teaching. In the early church, the breaking of bread, i.e. sharing a meal, was a sacred thing. It was tied together not only with feeding the body, but food for the soul and a remembering of Jesus last supper and his giving himself up as a sacrifice for the world. It was a simple thing, but highly important, so it was held as sacred, vital, set apart.

Certainly, when we celebrate Holy Communion, we treat it as special, but I wonder how many folks still have their family meals with the same sense of importance? Over the past year, my family and I have been practicing creating a more sacred space for our meal time. As often as possible, we sit down together at the dinner table, phones away or off, television off and we share a meal. We might talk about our days, highs and lows, or we might discuss the week ahead and what we are looking forward to or not looking forward to. But what we have found with this intentionality is that supper time becomes more sacred, more of something we look forward to celebrating together. It has become more important and part of our family ritual. Not that we are able to do this every night, but when we are, meal time has become a far more meaningful experience than before. Not just filling bellies or satisfying hunger, it can be a time of closeness, of fellowship. Quite often we prepare the meal with each of us taking a part to bring it all together. For me, this is sacred time. It has allowed me to be more present with my family. It has allowed me to set aside other things in order to be with them.

Many of you probably have heard that I will be on sabbatical from around May 15th to August 15th. What this means is that I will not be preaching or presiding but rather seeking renewal from some activities that are meant to give me space to go deeper into this question that has been on my heart; How do we go about making our

breaking of bread (fellowship) more sacred in the life of the church and in our personal lives? One of the activities that I refer to is I will be sitting with and hopefully breaking bread with different cultures; Jewish, Muslim, Hispanic/Latino, Indigenous, Amish & Mennonite. My goal is to speak with folks ingrained in these cultures and ask them what they do to make fellowship more sacred.

While I am away, I invite Immanuel to be examining the same question and dreaming about what we as a congregation could do that involves creating more sacred space around meals and fellowship. What will that look like? It could be a new meal ministry or a bread-baking ministry or a communion bread ministry. The only limit is the limit we place on ourselves really.

Upon my return, I would love to share with you what I learned and how I spent time in spiritual and physical renewal. And then, I would love to hear what ministry Immanuel has undertaken or plans to undertake that will help make our fellowship and breaking of bread a more sacred part of our lives together.

I am excited about what God has in store for all of us, because I know that God is in the habit of making all things new. May God guide and direct our ministries and our way forward and may we grow deeper in our trust that God has something incredible planned out for this body of faith.

it’s true we can’t choose privilege, we still have the toolbox with us all the time.




We can choose to keep the tools for ourselves, or we can choose

SIMPLY GIVE PROGRAM WITH MEIJER


Meijer's is a family-owned company with a focus on enriching lives in the communities they serve. The Grand Ledge store is currently in their **Winter Simply Give Campaign** which runs through Saturday, April 1 with the donation for this first quarter of the year going to the Grand Ledge Food Bank. Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Our annual Ministerial Meeting will be held on Sunday, February 12, 2023. It will follow our 10 am service. As with the weekly service, you will be able to attend the meeting either in-person inside, in the parking lot or via live stream. The purpose of this meeting is to review our congregational goals together for the coming year. Remember, every voice matters so we will be doing everything we can to assist people on getting questions or concerns answered. There will be an easel available so we can capture any and all ideas.

Members from each of our Teams---Gathering, Preparing, Serving, Support, and Kitchen Update will share the ministries they're looking forward to working on in 2023.

We are looking at having plans completed to update our current kitchen. After our Kitchen update team has done some research, it has been determined that our church is considered a commercial building so in order for us to move forward we need to have plans drawn up prior to soliciting bids to have the work completed. The cost for these plans is \$5000. These funds will be taken from an account that was collected as part of a donation made while Professional Party Planners was using our facilities as their base of operations. The funds were set aside for maintenance issues that might have arisen before or after the kitchen was reclaimed by our church family. The update will need to be completed for us to use the kitchen for any ministries or events moving forward. This will be decided by a ballot vote that will be handed out at the meeting.

I would like to get the congregation's opinion on changing the way the meeting notices are delivered to the congregation. Under our current Bylaws it is suggested that we mail the meeting notices via United States Postal Service 14 days prior to the scheduled meeting date. Now we are sending out more information electronically, and the current Bylaws support communicating meeting notices via publications the pastor or congregation may periodically use. I would like to see us use electronic methods, saving money on postage and printing of the documents to be mailed out, similar to how the monthly newsletter and team meeting minutes are now communicated. People can still request a mailed copy. We send out 12 packets every month to members who do not use the electronic methods. If we remain with the current method, we will mail out approximately 150 letters. Just an idea to help our church be better stewards of church funds, the environment, and continue to evolve in the ever changing world of more digital communications (paperless).

Prior to the start of Church services on Sunday mornings I intend to make an announcement about the meeting so we are sending the information out to reach as many of our brothers and sisters as we can. I want to reach everyone possible so all are informed and all can participate.
