FOOD FOR THOUGHT...a note from Your Pastor

The LORD will surely comfort Zion and will look with compassion on all her ruins; he will make her deserts like Eden, her wastelands like the garden of the LORD. Joy and gladness will be found in her, thanksgiving and the sound of singing. Isaiah 51

You may already be aware of the beautiful Memorial Garden we have on the east side of the church building. It has been part of Immanuel for a long time, both as a place of inurnment and a place of quiet meditation and conversations. The folks that have worked on it over the years and the ones that continue that ministry, have done a wonderful job tending to God's creation in our little garden.

At our Congregational Ministry Meeting in early February, I spoke briefly about a project for the Memorial Garden. It is called a Columbarium and it is granite structure that has niches for a loved one's cremains. Once the urn (or urns) is placed in the niche, it is sealed up with a granite plate and then another granite cover over every four of the niches. After this has been done, the decedent's name would be engraved on that cover. The columbarium would be an enhancement to the beauty of the garden and would include a bench seat for quiet meditation and prayer. It is also a practical decision and I believe good stewardship.

One of the main reasons we are putting forth this project, is because the earthen cross where forty-three of our past members are inurned, is running out of room. A granite columbarium such as the one we are looking at would provide forty-eight niches for a loved one's cremains along with spaces for memorializing loved ones that are interned elsewhere.

At our recent retreat, the council agreed to move forward with "phase one" of this project which entails coming up with a cost estimate for one (48 space) columbarium with concrete foundation per manufacturers specifications with space reserved for a second columbarium adjoining somewhere in the future. We will outline

costs for members who would like to have cremains interred there and any stipulations necessary to make this all work. After that step, we will begin to move forward with funding, via pre-purchases of niches, Thrivent sources and private donations. A rough estimate for phase one cost is thirty-thousand dollars. However, at some point in time the pre-purchases will cover all costs and actually create a reserve. (perhaps for phase two!)

I am excited about this project because I believe it will further enhance the already beautiful Memorial Garden and offer folks another reason to visit Immanuel. It could be a source of outreach for "non-members" who need a place close by to visit and remember their loved one.

If you would like more information, see some pictures, hear more about costs and recouping those costs, please come and visit me and I'd be happy to share all the information I have. God is with us each step of the way and I believe will continue to guard and guide us so that the body of Christ, known as Immanuel, will thrive and excel in taking on God's kingdom work. Blessed be the Name of the Lord!!

Altar Colors

Lent is the season of the church following the season of Epiphany. During Lent, we read and learn about God's grace. We prepare, through faith, for the joy of Easter. We are led to examine our hears and lives during Lent, and scriptures and teachings are about God's grace and His love. The color of Lent is Purple.

Holy Week begins the week before Easter with Palm Sunday and concludes on Good Friday. The altar for Holy Week is White. Good Friday is the day of darkness, where we reflect on the crucifixion of Jesus. It is a day of mourning and reverence, quiet and solemnity. The altar is bare, and the Cross is draped in black.

Three days later is Easter Sunday, where with Joyful Hearts we Celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus, new life and Re-birth. The altar color on Easter is White

Holy Week

<u>Palm Sunday, March 24th, 10am</u> ~ Palm Sunday worship, will begin in the Narthex with the Triumphal Procession with the palm branches.

<u>Maundy Thursday, March 28th, 7pm</u> ~ Worship on Maundy Thursday, will be a fairly simple service with hand washing and communion.

<u>Good Friday, March 29th, 12 Noon</u> will be a Service of Shadows. There will also be a Community Worship Service at Trinity Episcopal Church at 7pm, 201 E. Jefferson St. in Grand Ledge.

<u>Easter Sunday, March 31st</u> ~ Breakfast at 8:30am, Worship at 10am: a Celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord! Inside, Drive-In and Livestream Worship.



COUNCIY CORNER


Let us build a house where love can dwell, and all can safely live. A place where saints and children tell, how hearts learn to forgive.
