FOOD FOR THOUGHT...a note from Your Pastor

So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand. Isiah 41

Watching one of those "finding my ancestors shows", I was reminded how resilient we can be as humans. There are so many stories of how this person or these people, in spite of all odds, made it across the ocean and landed in the United States. Even after landing here, they had to deal with numerous hurdles in order to just survive. But so many of them did survive, and even thrive and this is why we are the United States that we are today; because of all those who came here (and continue to come!) But I wonder if we sometimes take the "pull yourself up by your own bootstraps" thing a little too far. What about the times when we run face first into something that is obviously bigger than we are and stronger than we can be? If we have only learned to rely on ourselves, what to do then? It's easy to say trust in God, but it doesn't feel like that is our first go-to when things hit the fan. We still often feel like we need to fly solo.

Perhaps we can learn a different way. One that recognizes that we are all human and we are inter-connected, inter-dependent, one with each other. When one of us falls, we all fall. There is a tune playing on Christian radio these days called "Dear Younger Me". In it the singer muses on what he would tell his younger self if he were able to. He goes through some of the common pieces of advice until he gets to this line, "Dear younger me,

It reminds me that whenever I encounter obstacles in my life, I am called to lay them down before God. Even the ones that happened years ago and are still carried as burdens. Lay them down before God, you weren't meant to carry them anyway. We don't need to do this life on our own. We are inter-connected with all other humans and we are connected with God through Jesus Christ. So let us learn, again, to lean on one another and to turn to our trust in God when this world sends obstacles. God has not failed us yet!

Community Connections

A Community of Believers, Movers and Changers

Last year when I attended the Delta Community Choir concert, I heard of a non-profit "Capital Area Diaper Bank" that resonated with the work I used to do with families, and the needs they had with very few resources available to them. "Parents cannot place their children in childcare without sufficient diapers, which might lead to losing work or not attending school. It might also mean juggling between purchasing food, paying bills or providing for their basic needs."

In conversation with my sister, who is a Hospice Social Worker in a northern community, there is also a need for adult diapers or briefs, for people with disabilities, in Hospice care, for aging adults along with those with disabilities. "Incontinence is the 2nd leading cause of institutionalization. Seniors unable to afford enough incontinent supplies often become homebound, which could lead to depression."

Diapers can be a heavy financial burden for families, whether for babies/children or adults, so our Community Connections project for May will be a Diaper Drive for The Capital Area Diaper Bank. From Birth to Death or as I like to call it, "The Bookends of Life."

We will be collecting size 3-7 baby/children's diapers and size Medium and Large adult diapers/Depends beginning May 5th and taken to Cardboard Prophets the last week of the month. Watch for more information to come. Blessings!



Did You Know?

Did you know that Immanuel has an AED defibrillator? It is located on the street level, at the foot of the stairs, right hand side when ascending. I had not really noticed this device being in the building, until as a council member I was told the battery within the device was no longer working. I followed up on this immediately and am happy to report, it is once again working properly.

I learned that having and utilizing an AED on someone in need stands a 70% chance of full recovery, versus not having one and awaiting upon EMT's to arrive, which is a 30% chance of a full recovery. This device is meant to be easy to use. There is a pad within the box of the AED that you place on the patient. Then there is a start button. The machine then tells you what you need to do.

I am not familiar with how to use an AED. I am considering contacting the Red Cross to set up a class for members of our congregation. I need feed back from you to let me know if you too would like to learn how to use an AED. Send me an email at papagass@gmail.com if you would. I am thinking of finding a Saturday to have a class, but that will be dependent upon instructor availability. It's my hope to hear from at least a dozen people who would be willing to learn. I also believe it would be a good idea to learn CPR at the same time.

The Day of Pentecost begins on the seventh Sunday after Easter Sunday (May 19th.) It commemorates the descent of the Holy spirit upon the

Virgin Mary and the Apostles and other followers of Jesus. Readings during Pentecost will focus on the teachings of Jesus.

The Color for the First Sunday of Pentecost is Red.
After the first Sunday, the color on the altar will be replaced with Green, symbolizing new life. Pentecost is the longest season in the church calendar, lasting until October.
